REPORT


Our group of eight enthusiasts proved to be a flexible group of independent spirits. We had break out subgroups for different types of hikes, and enjoyed sharing as we gathered in the campground. Thankfully, our campsites were near one another.

Cape Blanco Campground is beautifully laid out, with campsites and some cabins clustered around the bathroom and shower facility (which was very clean and had hot water). The rich flora and canopies of trees afforded privacy and quiet spaces, supplied with picnic table, fire pit, water, and electricity. No bear to worry about, but a racoon opened Elisabeth's cooler and climbed in to enjoy some yogurt and make off with her naan, leaving some dirty footprints. Alas, the cooler spent the rest of the stay in the car. Our only challenge was the extraordinary wind, amplifying the chill. While we were able to dress warmly, the necessary counterpressure against the wind was just short of exhausting. The 'silver lining' was breathing crystal clean coastal air in summertime. Tysen and Diane also faced a challenge in erecting their 9'x12' tent, which sleeps six, in the 10-25 mph wind. With the help of the others, it was erected, staked down and even tethered to a camping table to keep it from being blown over during the night.

We enjoyed some walks on the Cape: A trail to the Lighthouse from the campground across a vast 'wilderness' of dry grassy terrain; breakfast on the beach or bluff to take in the views out to sea; and strolls in the dark and dense woods that Barb proclaimed the 'scariest' and we wouldn't have been surprised by a Hobbit popping out to greet us. There are other trails in the camp environment, such as to Hughes House (now closed), along the bluff above the south shore, along the north bluff or on the north beach (at lower tides) all the way to the Sixes River. The heavy winds inspired us to pick hikes off the Cape in the Floras Lake State Park.

Tuesday:

It was a lovely stroll in the forest and impressively windswept on the cliffs and Blacklock Point. 


